But, we all know that the Black dream is still not a fulfilled reality because, even in our lifetime and today, we know that prejudice still exists. Martin Luther King Jr's dream of seeing his Black son walking hand-in-hand with a little White girl has not come to fruition. And, even though there have been laws passed to institute an integrated society, the dream still remains elusive.

In some ways what exists in our sinful world is not what Jesus envisioned. Jesus saw a world in which love eclipsed power and oppression. So, as we celebrate American independence, in such a time like this, it is important and crucial that Christians take seriously our Christian freedom. In his Treatise on Christian Liberty Martin Luther wrote that, when Christians are by our love for God and others, we would devote our lives to service. Luther asserted that our freedom is not license to do whatever we please, but a liberation to live a life of joyful obedience and service to God and our neighbor.

We live in a diverse and multifaceted culture and it seems that **God is** challenging us to see the world in new ways, to appreciate the kaleidoscope of color, race, and ethnicities. Jesus certainly saw his world differently than the religious legalism of his time and he welcomed the outcast, the sinner, and excluded. Who are we challenged to welcome?

In the current political climate, it seems that much of humankind has distanced ourselves from God and the fruit of that God-less spirit has resulted in division, futility, frustration, and hopelessness. God doesn't want this. **God wants the world to be free.** God wants the world to know that God loves the world. **God**

wants the world to have the fruits of his Spirit: love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and **self-control.** When the world produces that kind of fruit, then we will have real freedom. Food Pantry: St. Timothy has seen continuous increases in participants coming by for assistance. We served 231 in June, some visitors come weekly. We had 1100 pounds received from Portland Food Project and enormous support from members. Food is flowing out of the pantry. It is especially important to have water and other beverages on hand for the heat. We have handouts on the heat, other pantries close-by, Cultivate Initiatives for the houseless, and summer activities for families, especially parks.

I am so thankful for consistent and caring volunteers in the pantry. Also, thank you to our shoppers for helping purchase food when the shelves are low on food.

Snow-Cap: We continue to collect clothes and empty egg cartons for them. **Cultivate Initiatives:** We are planning Gods Work Our Hands in September at their facility.

JUNE 5TH SUNDAY: The recipient is Lutheran Community Services of the NW. Staff came to visit to tell us about their services including counseling and helping refugees/immigrants. This organization is a blessing to all of us. AUGUST 5TH SUNDAY: Our Fifth Sunday recipient for August is the American Cancer Society Relay for Life. We have supported this organization for many years and had a team to walk when Relay was more active. This year we want to dedicate our August 5th Sunday in honor of Jean Whitford who was always there to participate and support this event. So many others in our community have confronted cancer.
